# Meeting Overview

## Background

The primary objective for the FPHS Costing & Capacity Assessment Data Reporting and Interpretation meeting is to have the primary intended users shape the findings, recommendations, and reporting of the health department assessment data. The primary intended users (WALHDAB, health departments, public health leaders, and the WI DHS/DPH) are best positioned to inform the translation of data into meaningful actionable results.

## Meeting Purpose

Rede Group will facilitate a day-and a half in-person meeting to include representatives of WALHDAB Health Officers, WI Division of Public Health/Office of Policy and Practice Alignment, WALHDAB consultants, and key partners (UW PHI, WPHA PA representatives). The purpose of this meeting is to:

- Review FPHS Assessment data.
- Discuss findings in relationship to research and lived experience, as well as from alternative interpretations and explanations.
- Discuss themes and key findings.
- Ideate recommendations and identify costs, benefits, and challenges of implementing recommendations.
- Examine the findings and implications from various stakeholder perspectives.
- Identify audiences for WI FPHS Costing & Capacity Assessment report and drivers in their decision-making in allocating resources.

A summary of the meeting and the next phase of the project will be shared with WALHDAB Health Officers virtually, the second day of the meeting on November 7 from 1:15-2:00 pm.

## Expectations of Participants

- Complete the health department WI FPHS Costing & Capacity assessment for those serving as a Health Officer representative.
- Share experiences, insights, and opinions about the data and framing.
- Share back takeaways from the meeting during a follow-up meeting with all WALHDAB Health Officers and at regional WALHDAB meetings for Health Officers in attendance.
- Check assumptions, avoid premature judgment, enable multiple and diverse viewpoints.

## Next Steps

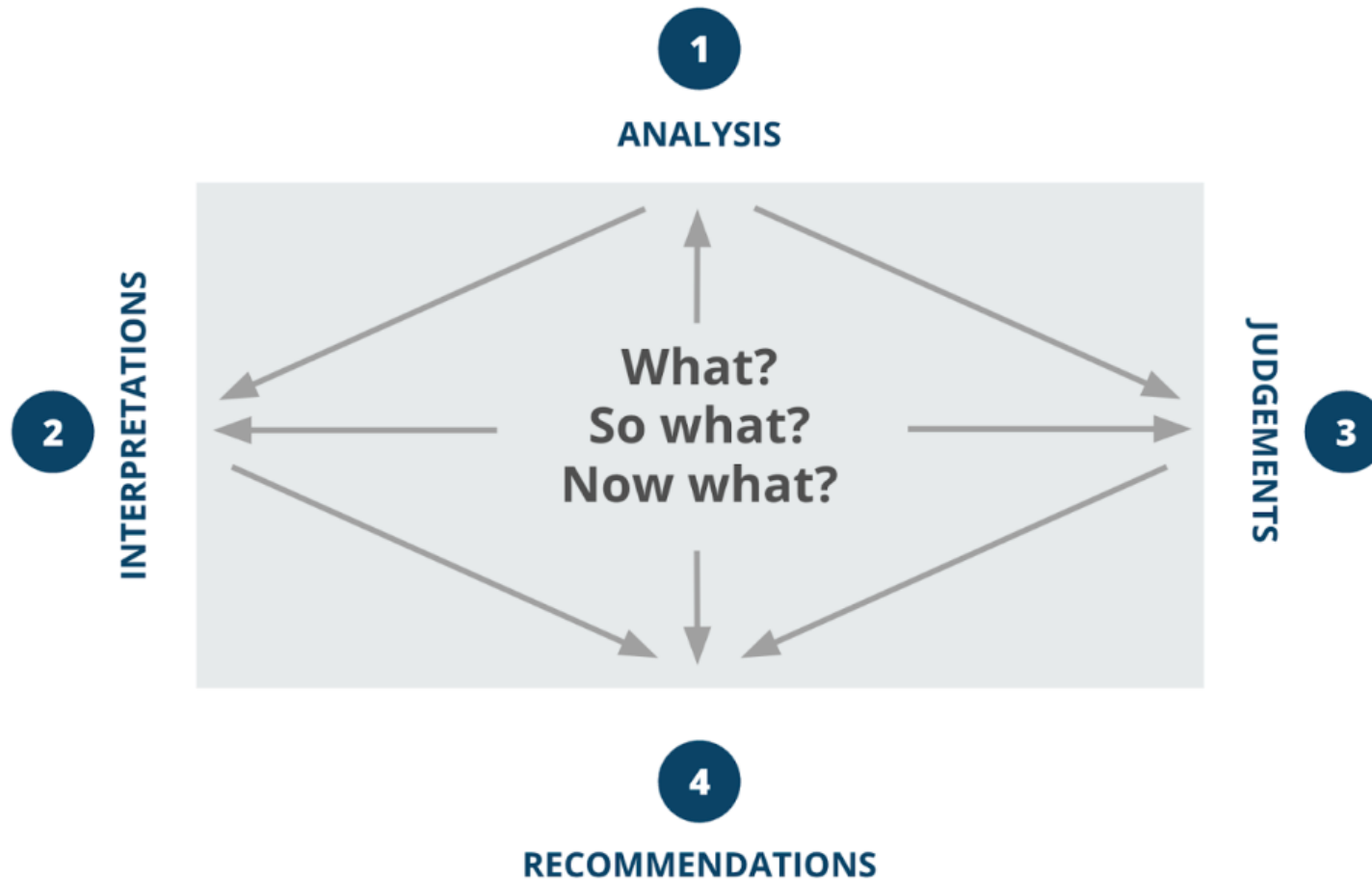
Rede will use the collective efforts of data interpretation, recommendations, and feedback from the participants of the November 6 & 7 meeting to create 2-3 formats of reports for varying use. WALHDAB will seek additional input from LHDs on draft reporting products (opportunities to be determined). Report products will be presented to the WALHDAB Executive Board for review and approval. The anticipated timeline for final reporting products is March 2024. In addition to the variety of flexible reporting materials, Rede will provide WALHDAB with the raw, de-identified, aggregated data. Decisions on use of reporting products and communication efforts will be part of the next phase of the project.

# Group Processes

## Analysis

### Purpose:

The only way to understand a data set is to get inside it. Without this foundation, interpretation, judgment, and recommendations will be flawed. In addition, evaluators can learn much from people most knowledgeable about the program in this step.

### Key question(s):

- Does the User Group understand the data collection methods, variables and calculations for descriptive statistics, definitions for what is actually being measured, analysis frameworks, limitations, and data gaps?
- Has the evaluator sought and listened to alternate approaches to methods for descriptive statistics, analytic framework refinements, limitations, and approaches to addressing/balancing limitations?

## Interpretation

### Purpose:

Without interpretation, the data are meaningless; it's necessary to go beyond the numbers to add context, determine meaning, and tease out substantive significance.

### Key question(s):

- Where does the User Group see interocular significance (i.e., what stands out)?
- Does the User Group collectively agree on what these findings mean?
- Has the group considered alternative interpretations?
- Do the interpretations stay within the confines of the evidence?

## Judgments:

### Purpose:

After agreeing on what data mean, User Groups must apply values and standards to render the findings useful. Evaluations and assessments exist to determine something. For example, is a program working? Where are there gaps? Which results are positive and which are negative?

### Key question(s):

- Which of the findings are positive and which are negative?
- What stands out as obviously good or obviously bad?
- What needs to be better?
- What can stay the same?
- How would stakeholders outside of the User Groups view these judgments?

## Recommendations

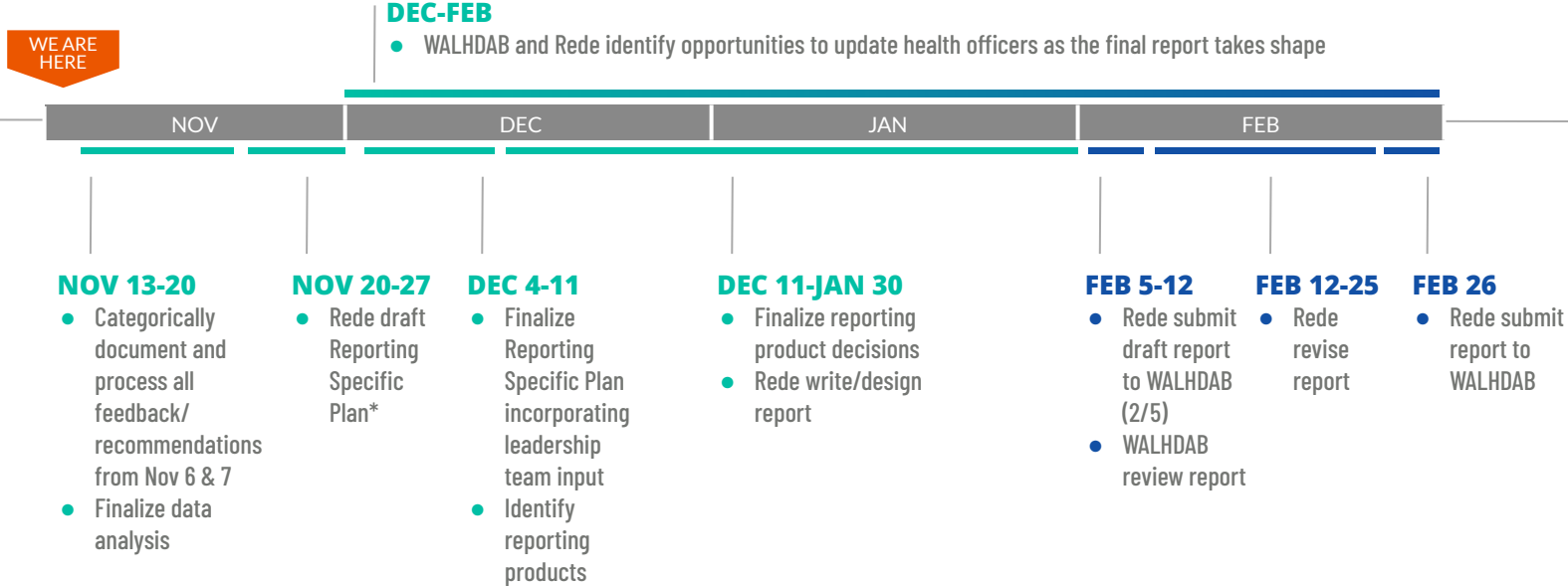
### Purpose:

Now, the question of what the results tell us about what should happen next comes into focus. Recommendations are the action steps of evaluation and assessment.

### Key question(s):

- What are the action implications of the findings?
- What should be done next?
- Are there different kinds of recommendations?
- What are the implications of recommendations?
